- Low-income parents of children not in afterschool
- High-income parents of children not in afterschool
- White fathers of children in afterschool
- African American & Latina mothers of children in afterschool

#### **Online Bulletin Board**

- 23 "education opinion influencers"
- Defined as: Registered to vote, have children under the age of 18 living at home with them, have at least a bachelor's degree, earn more then \$100,000/yr, consume news regularly from at least two sources, & engaged in at least 3 levels of civic participation on an education policy issue in the past year.

### **Initial Recommendations**

### **Connect afterschool** to learning

Be explicit

Focus on broadening opportunity

- Position quality afterschool as integral part of the learning process
- Talk about afterschool as new opportunities for learning and giving kids new experiences
- Don't over-rely on STEM
- Broaden the notion of safety in the hours afterschool
- Define the benefit to parents
- Policymakers need statistics, and need them cited
- Don't focus on achievement gaps
- When talking about funding disparities, mention rural communities

### Methodology



#### **National Online Survey**

Lake Research Partners and the Tarrance Group designed and administered this survey that was conducted online from May 16 – May 23, 2018. The survey reached a total of 1,000 adults nationwide with an oversample of 200 adults living in rural areas.

The base sample was weighed by gender, region, age, educational attainment, race, and gender by race to reflect attributes of the actual population. The oversample was weighed by gender and age to reflect the attributes of their actual populations. The rural oversample was also weighed down into the base to reflect their natural proportion of adults in the country.

The margin of error for the sample is +/-3.1 for the total likely voter sample.








### Americans agree afterschool programs are an absolute necessity for their community.








### Americans agree afterschool and summer programs are an absolute necessity for their community.




Intensity ("strong yes") increases among partisans when asked if afterschool and summer programs are an absolute necessity for their community compared to afterschool programs on its own.








### Adults are concerned when they hear a proposal cut federal funds for afterschool and summer programs




Republicans are much more concerned about eliminating all federal funds, as well as people in urban areas and rural areas.

In our national poll, 70 percent of respondents said that they are opposed to eliminating all federal funds for afterschool and summer learning programs.








## Americans overwhelmingly believe funding needs to be increased across the continuum of education. People are as supportive of increasing funding for afterschool programs as K-12.

Please indicate if you think public funding for each of the following should be increased, decreased, or kept the same:



People want government to set aside specific funds to be used for afterschool programs regardless of whether it is their local or state government.






In our national poll, a strong majority of respondents say they want federal, state, and local leaders to provide funding for afterschool and summer learning programs




















#### Democrats more strongly value "support" when considering children in low-income communities.







Across the board, "jobs of the future" is a stronger payoff for afterschool programs helping young people gain foundational skills like teamwork and communication than "help them land their first job," in particular among urban communities and Republicans.




