What's New? Readiness Requirements for High School Graduates

All Ohio students graduating in 2023 and beyond* must meet new graduation <u>requirements</u> that demonstrate how their academic and technical skills align with their plans for life after high school. Students must earn two diploma seals, including one that is designed by the state and one that is determined by their high school.

The Opportunity

Afterschool is the perfect place for students to earn the OhioMeansJobs-Readiness Seal, which counts toward this graduation requirement and focuses on entrepreneurial learning that helps youth develop critical workforce and life skills, including collaboration, critical thinking, and leadership.

The Ohio Afterschool Network (OAN) offers FREE training and resources afterschool programs can use to help students earn the OhioMeansJobs-Readiness Seal, including:

- 12 lessons for afterschool educators to be facilitated by afterschool and summer program staff
- **Guidance** for working with school administrators to obtain district approval
- Materials programs can use to promote this new offering to families, schools, community partners, local businesses and funders

*Students entering ninth grade on or after July 1, 2019

Form new partnerships with schools

Many school districts need help identifying opportunities for students to meet these new requirements. OAN worked with the Ohio Department of Education to develop the pathway to the OhioMeansJobs-Readiness Seal. Engage local businesses and community leaders

To earn the OhioMeansJobs-Readiness Seal, students must complete an in-person or virtual job shadowing experience with a volunteer work mentor. Programs and students can collaborate to invite area businesses to participate.

High school students need and want exciting new opportunities to explore careers and develop the skills they need to succeed. Show them what your program has to offer!



Attract new funding

Potential funders, including 21st Century Community Learning Centers, foundations and corporate donors, look for innovative workforce and youth development programming. One Columbus program was recently awarded \$20,000 from a local corporation to facilitate entrepreneurial education.
